STORYLINES

- Tulane continues its busy first nine days of the 2016-17 season with three games in four days at the 2016 Tire Piros Invitational (previously the Tire Pros Puerto Rico Shootout) in Orlando, Fla. at the HP Field House inside the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex. The Green Wave are competing in their first multi-team tournament since taking part in the Cure UCD Classic during the 2013-14 season.
- Tulane has its sights on sitting above .500 through five games for the sixth time in seven seasons. Through five games over the previous six seasons, the team's record has been: 3-2 (2010-11), 5-0 (2011-12), 3-2 (2012-13), 4-1 (2013-14), 4-1 (2014-15) and 2-3 (2015-16).
- Tulane got the first win of the Mike Dunleavy, Sr. era on Nov. 14 with a 93-76 victory over Southeastern Louisiana at Avron B. Fogelman Arena in the Devlin Fieldhouse. • Up next after the Tire Pros Invitational, the Green Wave have a pair of road contests at Georgia Tech (Nov. 26 at 6:30 p.m. on ACC Network Extra) and at in-town rival New Orleans (Nov. 29 at 7 p.m. on Cox Sports) before returning to Fogelman in Devlin on Dec. 2 to take on St. John's (7 p.m. on ESPNews).

THE OPPONENTS

Joining Tulane on one side of the bracket for this year's Tire Pros Invitational are Arizona State, Northern Iowa and Oklahoma.

Davidson, Clemson, Missouri and Xavier are the four teams on the other side of the bracket.

THE SERIES

Thursday's matchup with Oklahoma marks the third meeting between the two schools. The series is tied at 1-1 with the Green Wave getting a 49-32 win on Dec. 30, 1947 in the Sugar Bowl Classic played in Municipal Auditorium. The Sooners won the last meeting 83-69 on Nov. 25, 2000 in the Big Island Classic in Hilo, Hawaii.

Tulane has never faced Northern Iowa and lost its only other meeting with Arizona State (119-70 in the Roadrunner Tournament in Las Cruces, N.M. on Dec. 22,

The Green Wave are 1-1 vs. Davidson, 0-2 vs. Missouri and have never faced Clemson or Xavier.

EARLY SIGNEES

BUL AJANG & BUAY KOKA

Bul Ajang and Buay Koka are set to join Tulane for the 2017-18 season from from The Patrick School in Hillside, N.J., coached by Chris Chavannes. Entering this season, The Patrick School is ranked No. 6 in the country by MaxPreps and ranked No. 10 in the USA Today Sports Super 25 Preseason Rankings.

The pair from South Sudan will add much needed height and athleticism to the Green Wave next year as Ajang stands at 6-10 and Koka towers at an even 7-0. Ajang will bring an all-around talent with his ability to finish with both hands and shoot from the outside, while Koka will be a presence in the middle as a rim protector and rebounder with a seven-foot, seven-inch wing span. In addition to being teammates at The Patrick School, the two also play together on the Just Basketball AAU team.

Ajang and Koka and excel in the classroom at The Patrick School, each maintaining a GPA above 3.5. At Tulane, Ajang is planning to pursue a degree in engineering and Koka is planning to pursue a degree in public health. The two chose Tulane over several other high major Division I offers.

NEW WAVE

The Mike Dunleavy, Sr. era is underway for Tulane men's basketball with hopes high for a return to national prominence under the tutelage of a legendary coach making his first foray into head coaching at the college level.

Prior to Dunleavy, four of the last five Green Wave head coaches notched a win in their debuts — Charles Moir in 1973-74, Ned Fowler in 1981-82, Dave Dickerson in 2005-06 and Ed Conroy in 2010-11. Perry Clark lost his first three games in his first season in 1989-90 before registering his first win. Clark went on to guide Tulane to three NCAA Tournament and four Postseason NIT appearances over his 11 seasons.

Dunleavy got his first Tulane victory in his second game leading the Green Wave - Nov. 14, 2016 vs. Southeastern Louisiana.

LOCAL FLAVOR

More than half of Tulane's 2016-17 Tulane roster hails from not only the state of Louisiana, but New Orleans itself.

Riley Conroy (New Orleans, Jesuit), Jordan Cornish (New Orleans, Brother Martin), Melvin Frazier (Avondale, L.W. Higgins), Von Julien (Reserve, Riverside), Malik Morgan (River Ridge, John Curtis), Blake Paul (New Orleans, Landry-Walker) and Colin Slater (New Orleans, Immanuel [Calif.]) all hail from the New Orleans area. In addition, Darian Jones is from Brusly, which is about 80 miles from New Orleans.

MORGAN ON THE MARK

Redshirt senior guard **Malik Morgan** notched the first 20-point performance of his Tulane career as he scored the team's first seven points of the game and drained four three-pointers en route to a 23-point day at Cincinnati on Jan. 24, 2016.

Earlier in the 2015-16 season, Morgan did not miss a shot in posting a 14-point performance against Georgia Tech on Dec. 5, 2015. He went 6-for-6 from the field, including a pair of threes. It was the first time a Green Wave player has had a perfect performance from the field since **Eric Vianney** went 6-for-6 against Rice on Jan. 10, 2009.

TRANSFERS

Junior guard **Jordan Cornish**, a transfer from UNLV, and sophomore forward **Samir Sehic**, a transfer from Vanderbilt, will not play this season due to NCAA transfer rules. Cornish will have two years of eligibility remaining and Sehic will have three years of eligibility remaining.

TULANE VS. RANKED OPPONENTS

Tulane holds an 11-51 record since the 1989-90 season against opponents ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 Poll.

The Green Wave's most recent matchup with an AP Top 25 foe was this year's 95-75 loss to No. 6/6 North Carolina on Nov. 11.

The last time Tulane hosted a Top 25 team at Avron B. Fogelman Arena in the Devlin Fieldhouse was Jan. 17, 2016 against No. 10 SMU. The Mustangs won that game 60-45. That was the last time the Green Wave hosted a top 10 opponent at Fogelman in Devlin since No. 1 Memphis came to town on Feb. 20, 2008. The Tigers won that matchup 97-71.

ON THE BOARDS

One aspect Tulane wants to carry over from a season ago is being aggressive in rebounding on both ends of the floor. Last season, Tulane outrebounded its opponent in 18 of the 34 games. The Green Wave brought down 50 rebounds as a team in the win over Southern Miss on Dec. 22, 2015, marking the first time a Tulane team as had 50-plus rebounds in a game since grabbing 51 against Lamar on Dec. 30, 2010.

So far this season, the Green Wave outrebounded Southeastern Louisiana 38-29 but was outrebounded by North Carolina 52-38.

BLOCK PARTY

Also last season, Tulane put together a two-game block party over a five-day period with 12 blocks against UConn on Jan. 2, 2016 and 10 blocks at Memphis on Dec. 29, 2015. The 10 blocks at Memphis marked the first time the Green Wave reached double figures in the category since swatting 10 shots against Nicholls on Nov. 16, 2007. The 12 blocks matched a program single-game record that was accomplished on four other occasions.

So far this season, the Green Wave recorded four blocks in each of their first two games.

CALL IT A COMEBACK

Tulane notched its largest comeback victory in program history against Stephen F. Austin on Nov. 27, 2015, during the Challenge in Music City in Nashville. The Green Wave trailed by as many as 26 points in the game, but overcame the deficit and topped the Lumberjack on a late shot by **Dylan Osetkowski** for its first lead of the night and the victory. Before that victory, Tulane had never trailed by 20 or more points and comeback to win. Since 2000-01, the largest deficit the team had overcome to win was 17 points.

POSTSEASON RUN

Tulane had a flare for the dramatic in the 2016 American Athletic Conference Tournament with back-to-back conference tournament wins for the first time since the 1982-83 season and back-to-back postseason wins for the first time since the 1996 Postseason NIT. The Green Wave's victory over UCF in the first round was the first postseason win for Tulane since the 2013-14 season (66-62 win over North Texas in the Conference USA Tournament). The win over Houston to advance to the semifinals was the Wave's first win against the Cougars since the first meeting as members of The American on Jan. 17, 2015.

TULANE IN OVERTIME

Tulane enters the season with a 35-42 all-time record in overtime games and a 4-4 mark all-time in back-to-back overtime games.

The Green Wave earned their first three-plus overtime win after topping East Carolina, 100-92, in triple overtime on Feb. 10, 2016. Tulane entered the game 0-5 all-time in three-plus overtime games. Three days later, the Olive and Blue earned a 94-87 win over Memphis in overtime in their second, back-to-back overtime games of the season. The Wave opened the 2015-16 season with consecutive overtime games.

FINAL FOUR HEADED BACK TO NOLA

In announcement made on Nov. 10, 2016, the NCAA and the Division I Men's Basketball Committee announced the 2022 Men's Final Four will be played in New Orleans with Tulane serving as the host institution.

New Orleans will host the Final Four for the sixth time overall and the first time in 10 years. New Orleans traditionally has been one of the most popular Final Four cities and has provided several iconic championship moments that will be celebrated as anniversaries in 2022.

The 2022 Final Four will mark the 40th anniversary of the 1982 title game in New Orleans, which featured North Carolina, led by coach **Dean Smith** and **Michael Jordan**, against head coach **John Thompson**, **Patrick Ewing** and the Georgetown Hoyas. The Tar Heels won the game 63-62 on Jordan's jumper with 15 seconds to play. It also will mark the 35th anniversary of the 1987 title game, featuring coach **Bob Knight**'s Indiana Hoosiers, who defeated coach **Jim Boeheim**'s Syracuse squad 74-73 on **Keith Smart**'s jumper with four seconds remaining.

The men's basketball committee decided to forego the traditional site selection process in choosing New Orleans, which narrowly missed being picked during the last bid cycle that concluded with Phoenix, San Antonio, Minneapolis, Atlanta and Indianapolis awarded the 2017 through 2021 Final Fours.

PRESEASON POLL

Tulane men's basketball was voted 11th in The American preseason poll, as voted on by the head coaches.

Cincinnati was tabbed as the favorite to win the 2016-17 regular-season title in the closest preseason poll in conference history. The Bearcats edged UConn as the preseason favorite with 95 points and six first-place votes to the Huskies' 94 points and five first-place votes.

MIKE DUNLEAVY, SR.

HEAD COACH FIRST SEASON SOUTH CAROLINA '76

Mike Dunleavy, Sr., was hired as Tulane's 24th head men's basketball coach in the 106-year history of the program on March 29, 2016. He begins his 18th season as a head coach and his first at the collegiate level in 2016-17.

Over the past 45 years, Dunleavy has played and coached in world championship games, directed hall of fame and all-star players, led NBA franchises, served as a television analyst and played in the NCAA Tournament.

The 1999 NBA Coach of the Year brings over 30 years of NBA experience, either as a player, general manager or head coach to the Green Wave.

A 17-year veteran as an NBA head coach, Dunleavy won 613 regular season games, the 24th-most in NBA history, with four different teams (Los Angeles Lakers, Milwaukee Bucks, Portland Trailblazers, Los Angeles Clippers) and amassed 38 playoff victories in his career.

Dunleavy has been a part of 1,266 victories as an NBA assistant coach, head coach, general manager, player and collegiate student-athlete.

Along the way, he coached five future Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Famers, including Earvin "Magic"

Johnson, Moses Malone, Scottie Pippen, Arvydas Sabonis and James Worthy, and a total of six players under Dunleavy were named NBA All-Stars on nine occasions, including Johnson (1992 MVP), Worthy, Elton Brown, Chris Kaman, Rasheed Wallace and Vin Baker.

Dunleavy also developed an extensive coaching tree during his time in the NBA with nine of his former assistant coaches becoming NBA head coaches, including **John Lucas, Kim Hughes, Eric Musselman** (current head coach at Nevada), **Tony Brown, Elston Turner, Frank Hamblen, Butch Carter, Randy Pfund** and **Bill Bertka**.

Dunleavy's longest tenure was with the Los Angeles Clippers for seven seasons (2003-10). He led the club to 215 victories and seven playoff victories. The Clippers enjoyed their best season under Dunleavy during the 2005-06 campaign when he led the franchise to 47 wins and advanced to the Western Conference semifinals. He stepped down as head coach in 2010 to serve as the team's general manager.

Dunleavy began his coaching career in 1987 as an assistant coach at Milwaukee, where he served for three seasons (1987-1990). He earned his first head coaching job in 1990 with the Los Angeles Lakers, succeeding **Pat Riley**. During his rookie season (1990-91), he led a lineup that featured the combination of Johnson and Worthy to a Western Conference title and to the NBA Finals where the Lakers lost the series to the **Michael Jordan**- and Pippenled Chicago Bulls.

Following the 1991-92 season, Dunleavy became the head coach in Milwaukee, where he led the Bucks to 107 wins in four seasons (1992-96) while also serving as the team's Vice President of Basketball Operations. He stepped away from the bench prior to the 1996-97 season to concentrate on his general manager duties with the Bucks for one season before taking the head coaching job in Portland.

Dunleavy coached the Trail Blazers for four seasons (1997-2001) and led the franchise to a 190-106 (.642) overall record and to four straight playoff appearances. The Blazers made back-to-back appearances in the Western Conference Finals in 1999 and 2000. Dunleavy's 1999-2000 team won 59 games, which matched the second-best single-season victory total in franchise history. Dunleavy earned the 1999 NBA Coach of the Year award after leading the 1998-99 Blazers to a Pacific Division-winning 35-15 record.

As a collegian, Dunleavy played at South Carolina from (1972-76) for legendary coach **Frank McGuire** and was a sixth-round draft pick (99th overall) by the Philadelphia 76ers in 1976. He played for the 76ers alongside future Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Famer "**Dr. J" Julius Erving** and helped the team to the NBA Finals as a rookie.

Dunleavy played in 438 games during his 12-year NBA career, which included stops at Houston (1978-82), San Antonio (1982-83) and Milwaukee (1983-85, 88-90). His best season was with the Rockets during the 1980-81 campaign when he averaged 10.5 points per game and started on a team that played in the NBA Finals. In his lone season in San Antonio, Dunleavy led the NBA in three-point percentage, connecting at a .345 (67-194) clip from behind the arc

A back injury prompted his unofficial retirement following the 1984-85 season and he worked for a New York investment firm before returning to the NBA as an assistant coach with Milwaukee for the 1986-87 season. He stayed on the Bucks' bench through the 1989-90 campaign, but returned to uniform in parts of two seasons (1988-89, 1989-90) when injuries to the Bucks' backcourt forced Dunleavy into the lineup.

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y., Dunleavy played collegiately at the University of South Carolina, where he finished his career as the school's third all-time leading scorer with 1,586 points. Dunleavy helped the Gamecocks to 81 victories and a pair of NCAA Tournament appearances. He appeared in 111 consecutive, starting his last 105. Dunleavy was a straight A student, majoring in psychology while at South Carolina.

GAME RECAPS

GAME 1: 6/6 North Carolina 95, Tulane 75

November 11, 2016 • Smoothie King Center

Three players scoring in double figures, including a career-high night from redshirt junior forward **Cameron Reynolds**, was not enough to withstand No. 6/6 North Carolina as Tulane men's basketball dropped its regular-season opener 95-75 at the Smoothie King Center.

Reynolds showed the maturation of his shooting touch with a career-high 21 points on 7-of-15 shooting from the floor. The Pearland, Texas, native had the hot hand from long range, hitting a career-high five three-pointers in his six attempts. Freshman guard **Colin Slater** put up 14 points in his collegiate debut and first collegiate start. Sophomore guard **Kain Harris** poured in 15 points off the bench and provided one of the Green Wave's highlights of the game with an emphatic dunk midway through the

Tulane (0-1) hung tough early on and kept the game within a couple of possessions until the later part of the first half when the Tar Heels (1-0) extended the lead to 10, 32-22, with 5:16 remaining before halftime. That final five-plus minutes saw North Carolina grow its lead to as many as 17 points before sophomore guard **Von Juilen** drained a triple just before the buzzer to make the score 46-32 at the break.

The Green Wave played with more poise and consistency in the second half, though Carolina maintained control over the final 20 minutes. Slater had five points in a Tulane seven-point run early in the half that cut the deficit to 11, 53-42, with just under 17 minutes remaining. However, that would be as close as the Wave woulld get as Justin **Jackson** scored 15 of his career-high 27 points in the second half to lead all scorers and secure a win for the Tar Heels.

GAME 2: Tulane 93, Southeastern Louisiana 76

November 14, 2016 • Avron B. Fogelman Arena in the Devlin Fieldhouse

Points were aplenty for Tulane men's basketball in the 93-76 victory over Southeastern Louisiana with five players scoring in double figures, highlighted by career nights by senior center **Ryan Smith** and sophomore guard **Kain Harris**.

The Green Wave (1-1) went over 90-point mark in regulation for the first time since a 100-61 win over Mississippi Valley State on Nov. 20, 2014, thanks in large part to the performances from Smith and Harris. Smith posted his first career double-double with a career-high 14 points and a career-high 10 rebounds. Harris set his career high in points for the second game in a row with 19 points off the bench.

Before Tulane took control the game in the second half, the Green Wave were in a tussle with the Lions (1-1) over the first 20 minutes. There were 16 lead changes in the first half alone as either team led by more than five points. Redshirt junior forward **Cameron Reynolds** gave the Wave that five-point advantage in the final second of the half on his three-pointer with 15 seconds remaining. Southeastern tacked on two free throws to make the score 42-39 at the break.

The see-saw battle continued in the second half, though Tulane would never relinguish the lead. The margin stayed within a couple of possessions until a Harris layup at the 6:40 mark stretched the lead to nine (74-65). A couple of minutes later, freshman guard **Ray Ona Embo** converted on a traditional, three-point play to move the lead to double digits for the first time (79-69). The Green Wave really started rolling from there, expandind the lead to 17 (88-71) with just under two minutes to play following a couple of made free throws by redshirt senior guard **Malik Morgan**.

Ona Embo's final five points at the line to secure the first win in the Dunleavy era.
